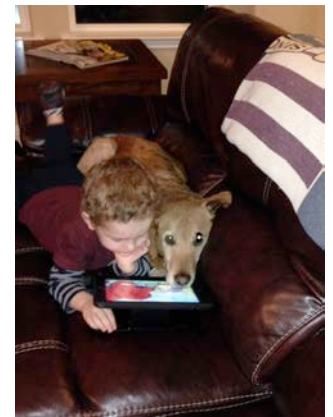
We often forget that in a way, by saving one golden, we are forever saving the adopter as well. And Lola is the perfect example of how dogs may not be our whole life, but they sure do make our lives whole.

Just recently adopted, when Lola initially came to our rescue group, her front leg had already been amputated, an injury stemming from being tethered to a rope while she rode in the back of her dad's pick-up truck. While riding down the road, she leaped out—and found herself hanging, one of her front legs tightly and hopelessly twisted and tangled in the rope. Her owner managed to free her—but not before the leg was damaged so badly that amputation was the only option.

Despite suffering a terrible tragedy, Lola's golden spirit could not be muted. Her previous foster mom said, "If I could pick the perfect home for Lola, I would place her with a child who was struggling with a bully at school or a family that had a rough life like hers. She seems to just know how to make everything better when my kids are sad."

Though she may have moved on to her forever home, Lola's presence will remain eternally with her foster family. While there are tears shed for the loss of a gentle and loving companion, they are the good kind: "Lola has taught my kids so much. It's amazing to see your kids love an animal like that."

And when Lola's forever family came to get her, the family's 15 month old gave Lola a big ol' drooly kiss which Lola reciprocated with a big ol' lick to the face. Volunteer Spotlight: Becky La Brum

How long have you been volunteering with GRR?

I've been volunteering since August of 2001, so about 12 ½ years now.



What made you want to volunteer with GRR?

Our first dog, Lulu, was a golden who came from a breeder. She was the best dog ever and made me want to do something to help golden retrievers who, unlike her, were not born with a silver spoon in their mouths! I started out just donating money, and then working Hotline, and then fostering, and then I got pulled down into the rescue vortex! We thought for sure our second dog would be a rescue golden and instead he turned out to be a gangly black Lab, but we got him through GRR, and he was one in a million. We have adopted seven GRR dogs in all.

What volunteer position do you hold?

Ha! I don't think my position really has a name. In my time I have done just about everything (intake direction, Hotline direction, foster coordinating, fostering, interviewing, home visits, lots of writing for the website), but now I mostly keep track of all our numbers. And I still work Hotline and do some writing.

Explain the activities you participate in as you fulfill this position.

I keep track of intakes & adoptions weekly, monthly & yearly as well as the dogs' ages, reasons for surrender, where they came from, etc. I send out a weekly update letting everyone know who came in, who got adopted, who's in the pipeline waiting, and so on. If someone e-mails asking how to surrender his or her dog, I am usually the one who responds.

About how many hours do you typically spend volunteering in this position?

I spend at least 7 hours a week. Sometimes more.

What is your favorite part about volunteering in this position?

As for keeping track of the numbers, it is pretty great to watch the list of intakes and adoptions growing throughout the year and imagine all those dogs together. That's a lot of goldens getting brand new lives! It's also interesting to see how the trends change year to year. For instance, we used to always bring in about 50% owner surrenders, 50% shelter dogs. In the past couple of years, the numbers are much more skewed towards shelter dogs. And I still love working Hotline. You get to know people who later become very active in the group, and there's always something new going on.

Describe a cute/funny/interesting story while volunteering in this position.

Well, you can't really come up with a funny story about keeping track of numbers. But living with dogs there's always something amusing going on. Our Lulu always performed panty raids in the laundry hamper (later I learned this is a golden trait!) and once presented a brand new bra to the plumber. Yikes! And I vividly remember letting my very first foster dog out to potty at 6 AM on a cold winter morning, still dark, and watching him take off like a shot towards the back of the yard after a squirrel. He could jump like a gazelle, and I was sure he was going to go right over the cyclone fence. So there I was in my undies, barefoot, racing across the freezing grass, pursuing a dog who had met me literally the day before, thinking "Oh no! I'm going to get fired as a foster family for sure!" Luckily I caught him in time and learned my lesson, namely close supervision at all times for new fosters.

(I'll tell you one other funny thing, I never did like dogs for much of my adult life & my husband had to twist my arm for ages to get me to agree to getting puppy Lulu. Now look at me.)

Give one piece of advice for volunteers interested in serving in this position.

For volunteers serving in any position in rescue, every little bit helps. Never underestimate what just one loving heart can do. And prepare to learn a lot from the goldens you help. I am constantly amazed at their resilience and positive attitude. It's pretty incredible.

What is one word that describes your experience while volunteering for GRR?

Oh... inspiring, rewarding, heartwarming, heartbreaking at times. Also addictive. (: Our rescue dogs really do amaze me. And there is just nothing like the feeling of taking in a shelter dog or stray or lonely backyard pup and having him fall asleep with his head in your lap, so trusting, or watching him snoozing on a nice soft bed, surrounded by toys, when it's icy cold or boiling hot outside, and knowing he will never have to worry about anything again.

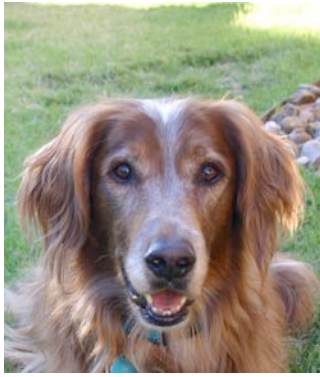

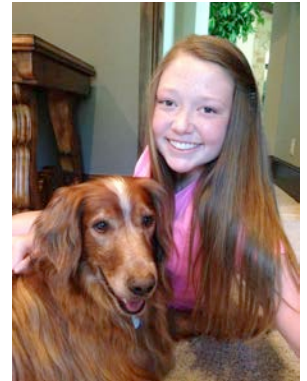
Winchester. After the loss of our last golden, Oakley, we went into this adoption nervous but also thrilled. We saw Winchester on the website and really thought he was a beautiful dog. We met him and fell in love. He sure had an interesting story, since he had lived in shelters and homes all over south Texas. And what an interesting time we have had settling into our home together.

As soon as he came home with us, Win fit in just perfectly. However, in the first couple days of coming into our home, he wouldn't let us leave the house without him. Whenever the door opened, he would run out into the garage and refuse to come back inside the house. Our matchmaker, Carol, taught us some tricks to use to get out of the house without Win coming with us. After we taught him those tricks, he learned to stay and lay down, and he would not move a muscle until we returned! Then he discovered he could watch from the front window. Now he waits patiently, watching the driveway for us to pull up.

Also, in the first couple days, I asked my dad if he could stop Winchester from waking me up every night. My dad didn't understand what I meant at first, but soon, he realized that Winchester goes up to check on me in the middle of the night—just to make sure I am ok.

Winchester is a very social dog, although he is still leash reactive. We have taken him to training at the Canine Center, and he is doing much better. He has become best friends with my grandmother's dog Buster, who is also a rescue dog. Surprisingly enough, he also loves my guinea pig, Olive. We were a little afraid his hunting instincts were too strong, and he would only see her as lunch, but they are friends now. In fact, they actually look a lot alike since they are both red with white patches on their foreheads.

Winchester is one of the funniest dogs you will ever meet. About a month and a half after we rescued him, we noticed a new funny behavior. One night, we were planning on having soup and some artesian bread. We left the artesian bread on the counter, and then we left the house. When we returned, the bread was nowhere to be found! We were so scared he ate the whole package, so we kept looking until we found it. To our surprise, it was perfectly placed under the cushion of the couch. And it was untouched! As the days went by, we noticed more and more things were hidden throughout the house, but remained completely untouched. My dad says that he is a "prepper," making sure we have supplies in case of disaster.



Winchester has become a very playful dog since he arrived. When we first adopted him, he had just completed his heartworm treatment, so we weren't sure how playful he would be. He didn't play a lot right away, but soon after... Oh my gosh! We started him off with a few toys, and now he can't get enough playtime! He has many toys now, and he grabs a toy and just runs around with it and even plays by himself. What a silly boy he is!

Winchester is also attentive and protective. In fact, if he sees a hawk fly outside, he will start to bark. He is very vocal and my dad is trying to teach him to say "I love you."

Winchester is the most adorable and loving dog. He is such a wonderful addition to our family. I don't know what we would do without him. Our family always says, "A home without a dog is just a house," and having Winchester completes us.

Homemade Holiday Treats: Banana Bites Recipe

Why should we limit holiday gifts to just our two-legged friends? To show your beloved golden you care, gather your kids in the kitchen to bake these canine *and* kid friendly holiday treats.

Start by gathering all the necessary ingredients:

- 3 cups oatmeal
- 1-1/4 cup of flour
- 2 eggs
- 1/4 cup oil
- 1/2 cup honey
- 1/2 cup milk
- 2 mashed bananas

Mix all the wet ingredients together first (oil, honey, milk, and bananas), and then add the flour and oatmeal until you have a smooth batter. Put older kids in charge of measuring and younger ones in charge of mixing. Everyone can help pour the batter onto a lightly greased cookie sheet, and then bake at 325 degrees (160 degrees Celsius) for 25 minutes. Once your banana bites are cool to the touch, use a knife or pizza cutter to slice them into small, bite-sized squares.



Dogs really go bananas for these yummy snacks, but don't let your pet eat too many, as they can be fattening. Particularly if your dog is prone to pudginess, be sure to limit him to just a few treats per day. Banana bites can also be used as incentive to exercise or do tricks. Keep them in the refrigerator until your dog does something treat-worthy.
